NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLAR: RYAN MORAN

Ryan Moran, a high school senior at the Yardley campus of New Hope Academy, was recently recognized as a National Merit Scholar. The National Merit Scholarship Program (NMSP) is an academic scholarship competition for university scholarships. To be eligible to compete for the scholarship in Pennsylvania, one must score at least a 1440 on the Prelim-

inary SAT (PSAT), which is exactly what Ryan accomplished. Out of the approximate 1.6 million high school juniors who took the PSAT in 2016, Ryan scored in the top 1% of the nationwide entrants.

Commemorating Ryan's outstanding achievements, The R.E.A.L. Deal squad interviewed him. Ryan took the PSAT twice, scoring 1370 out of 1520 in his sophomore year and 1440 in his junior year. Preparing for the test

was almost effortless as his knowledge in certain subjects comes natural. At first, when NHA Dean of Students, Jeremy Dickerson handed him the award, Ryan said, "Okay, cool," and continued what he was doing. But after plenty of praise, he admitted that being a National Merit Scholar makes him feel proud. Being a Boy Scout for seven years, he is close to being the highest rank, Eagle Scout which will benefit him when applying to colleges.

With all of his accomplishments, Ryan will have many options when it comes to colleges but he plans on going to Princeton University or the University of Pennsylvania, where he will major in either engineering or something science related. Ultimately, he hopes to earn his PhD.

EASTERN STATE PENITENTIARY

Eastern State Penitentiary located in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, was once the most famous prison in the world, but is now a US National Historic Landmark open publicly as a museum. The abandoned building was investigated on a show called, "Ghost Adventures" where even professional ghost hunters felt a sense of trepidation. Said to be one of the most haunted places in the nation, Eastern State gets transformed into a haunted house during Halloween called "Terror Behind the Walls" (TBTW). The six eerie attractions in actual cell blocks are assured to terrify visitors of all ages.

As a horror enthusiast, I was lucky enough to visit this unique exhibit to experience the all-encompassing fear that ghost hunters have talked about since Eastern State Penitentiary opened to the public.

While waiting in the line with hundreds of people trembling with anticipation, actors with creepy makeup from the museum interactively scared us. A man with stilts came up from behind and startled me. Before walking in the haunted house, a woman informed us about the "opting in" option: wearing a glow stick necklace allows the actors to interact physically with

the wearer (meaning they can grab you, put you in a prop/passageway, and touch you with their props). My courageous party and I decided to get the necklace.

The first cell block called "Lock Down" was indubitably the least alarming, probably with the intent of gradually easing in the scariness. It featured raging inmates with various prison-like mallets, chainsaw, and axes. Something I found unexpectedly scary was the flashing lights, they seemed to enhance the fearful effect. While in "Machine Shop," the second attraction, I got pulled away from my party, was asked, "Are you afraid of heights?" and guided to a staircase, where at the top, I escaped from a slide. The entire diversion had extremely tight corridors and plenty of actors grabbing the visitors. "Detritus" was a short outdoor exhibit replicating a graveyard which featured some tremendous jump scares. Probably the scariest of the six, "Infirmary" presented gory medical equipment, brutalized patients, and disturbing doctors. This attraction was also where I got pulled aside into a cage for three minutes with two other guests. My personal favorite, "Quarantine 4D" was full of psychedelic art. Its fluorescent atmosphere and usage of 3D glasses really made the experience enjoyable. The final attraction of the evening, "Breakout," started out with an actor giving the audience lineup a long rope and telling them not to let go until told. We roamed through the grim corridors as actors emerged to frighten us. The purpose of this exhibit was to simulate a prison escape.

Going into the Eastern State Penitentiary, my first intuition was that I was going to be mortified, especially after being convinced to opt in; but after a lot of telling myself, "they are just actors," I started to enjoy and even laugh at some of the attractions. I definitely recommend TBTW to anyone who is into haunted houses or willing to dare.







Cuphead, a game that boasts the slogan 'Don't Deal with the Devil!', was released on September 29th, 2017. Ever since it's release, Cuphead has received praise for its unique art style and cutthroat gameplay.

GORILLAZ RETURNS WITH HUMANZ

After years of hiatus, on March 23, 2017, the universally acclaimed band Gorillaz emerged with a fully animated music video for their brand-new song Saturnz Barz, and promises of a new album. True to the band's signature style, it's almost impossible to establish the entire album as only one genre. 

The lead singer, voiced by the actual creator of Gorillaz, is a timid blue haired man named 2-D, forced into the band by unfortunate circumstances and a rather villainous bassist called Murdoc. With a bass player and a singer, Murdoc by not-so-legal means recruits Russell, a laconic and mysterious drummer, haunted by the ghost of his deceased friend who possesses talent for rapping. 
